


Streak of Success in 5th year


Congratulations to Hayley Keogh on getting a small part in the Disney film Disenchanted starring Amy Adams and Patrick Dempsey, that is currently being filmed here in Ireland. We cannot wait to see it on the big screen! Hayley plays the lead role Maebh, in Sisters, an emotional film set in 1970's Catholic Ireland, directed by Etain Nash (2020). The film was a part of the online Fast Net film festival, which streamed at the end of May. I asked Hayley about her involvement with acting and why she likes it...











How did you get into acting?

I got into acting when I started Vicky Barry's, which is a stage school called Vicky Barry performing arts and that was around the age of seven or eight years old. I firstly started off in theatre acting but I much preferred film and TV acting. I started that when I joined Vicky Barry's talent agency around the age of ten or eleven.

What was your first role?

My first role was an AIB bank ad which I did at the end of 2016 with my brother, and then in 2017 I did two more adverts, one of them was for Electric Ireland, for an electricity ad and the next one was for cycling (promoting girls to start cycling to school) and that was for Green Schools Ireland.

What other work have you done?

My first film that I have done was a short film which I filmed for last January. It's called Sisters. I was the main role in that film. It hasn't been fully released yet, but there is a trailer online, on Instagram – that was for the national film school's graduation. It got a bit delayed due to coronavirus and for the past year and a half, it has just been [screened] through film festivals. It is being released this month (May). It tells the story of a young girl called Meabh [who] is the main character (my character) and it's about these young orphan girls in a convent, three sisters and it's based on true stories. It tells the story of how people and kids were treated in those homes.

Which actors inspire you?

An actor I'd like to work with is either Saoirse Ronan or Sofia Lilies. I think they're both amazing actors and I love the work they've done in shows and movies.

What do you like to watch?

My favourite genre of movie is probably horror and I really like the movie 'IT, Chapter One', and that's a movie that Sofia Lilies is in. I really like the show, 'I'm not okay with this' on Netflix. They are both my favourites because I really like the acting in them.

What other interests do you have?

Some other hobbies that I have would be singing, dancing and I really like skateboarding as well – I got into that last year.

Do you see yourself pursuing a career in acting?

Yeah, I would definitely like to pursue a career in acting. I used to think I didn't want to but now that I've started doing more film and TV acting, I definitely would like a career in it.

Why do you like acting?

I like acting because it helps me express different emotions that I wouldn't normally be able to do in real life – it brings me to a different place. It's really fun to experience and experiment with all these different emotions and I think that's why I prefer film acting to theatre acting, because for me theatre can feel quite forced. Film acting is more real, which is what I'm interested in.

Has the acting been affected by the pandemic?

The pandemic has affected me because I haven't been able to go to as many auditions. A lot of my auditions have been online. It's put back the short film I was in, Sisters, a good bit because we were supposed to do a premiere of that back in November but it was cancelled because of the pandemic. It has affected me in many ways, but I'm glad I got this role (Disney film) because it's really got me back on track with acting.

What about your future career in acting?

In ten years, I hope to see myself still acting. I hope to have a career in film acting and be in a few more films [in] main roles, because the Disney film that I'm in at the moment - which I'm really excited to be a part of - is a small [role]. I would also like to do bigger films, maybe more TV ads and really get myself out there.




German Poetry Winner





Art workshop in 5th year








On the 6th, 7th, and 13th of May, the fifth year Art class took part in three separate hour-long life sketching workshops over Microsoft Teams. The workshops were facilitated by artist Mark Heng, who has taken part in the Sky Arts Portrait Artist of the Year Competitions. Mark has painted many famous Irish personalities including actor Colm Meaney and Senator David Norris. His *Self-portrait with Hat and Apron* was shortlisted for the Hennessy Portrait Prize in 2015 and exhibited in the National Gallery of Ireland. Mark also creates caricatures and illustrations.

During these workshops, Mark showed us the tips and tricks that he uses to, excellently and swiftly, create realistic, detailed portraits. Heng showed us how to draw faces, expressions, and different positions. He also showed us how to create proportional figures to improve our own drawings. These workshops were unique for our school. In years prior, we would have been able to get artists like Heng to come in and work among the students but due to Covid-19 this was not possible. However, after taking part in these virtual workshops it's safe to say it was an absolute success. Not only did it make it easier for us to work with Mark, but it also meant students missing from school that day could attend. 
Guide Dog Awareness Week


6th year Study Hub via Skype

Study Support Programmes

Early study for 5th and 6th Year - approx. forty-five students began in first term on 14th September continuing until January 15th. Study runs daily from 4.15 to 6.15 except for Wed which is at 1.30-3.30.

Second term of early study began 22nd March with fifty-five students and continues up until 21st May. Late study also began on this date with seventeen 6th Years. Late study runs from 6.45 to 8.45 daily -Wed from 4-6.

Study was also held during Halloween Mid-term break for 6th Years.

This year we introduced on a trial basis permitting 6th Years to use their digital devices during Late Study which the students have found very useful.

Every student had a Study Skills presentation covering areas like Study Plans, importance of goal setting and best conditions for effective studying. We also had a Learning to Learn "presentation for all years which focused on the different learning styles and how knowing your learning style can lead to effective learning and studying.

Guidance Department

The guidance department had a busy year with several online speakers from a number of colleges for both 5th and 6th Year. Sixth year students had speakers from DCU, TUD (Technological University Dublin, one of our newest universities), St. Patrick's college Maynooth, UCD, Maynooth University, Marino College of Education, IADT, Carlow IT, Trinity College Dublin, Inchicore College, Newbridge Community College, NUIG and UL.

The fifth years had talks from UCD and DCU. Students from 4th, 5th, and 6th also attended several virtual open days. The guidance department also organised parent meetings for 6th year parents, and 4th year parents, as well as a CAO meeting, and an online information meeting for Leaving Cert Subject choices.

The 6th year group had a very active and busy year despite Covid-19 restrictions.

School Leadership

The Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator leads and co-ordinates special education allocation and interventions in HFSS. To do this, good relationships need to be in place between several stakeholders: students, parents, primary school teachers, SMT, teachers and other professional bodies such as NEPS psychologists. Planning takes place with the above regarding providing resources such as co-teaching and one to one interventions. Provision of these resources is granted on the principle that students with the greatest need receive the greatest resources.

The co-ordinator is also responsible for implementing guidelines and directives from the Department of Education and Science. Each student with an educational assessment has an individual education plan which contains some background on the student, a description of their educational needs and a short list of targets that can be adapted to each subject. This enables each teacher to plan a differentiated programme for that student to ensure that they achieve their educational potential.
