- "The Hate U Give" by Angie Thomas
- "Sixteen-year-old Starr Carter moves between two worlds: the poor neighbourhood where she lives and the fancy suburban prep school she attends. The uneasy balance is shattered when Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her best friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer. Khalil was unarmed.
- His death is a national headline. Some are calling him a thug, maybe even a drug dealer. Protesters are taking to the streets in Khalil's name. Some cops and the local drug lord try to intimidate Starr and her family. What everyone wants to know is: what really went down that night? And the only person alive who can answer that is Starr."
- Inspired by the Black Lives Matter movement, this is a powerful and gripping YA novel about one girl's struggle for justice. Once you've read the book I recommend watching the movie as well. Make a night of it and Facetime your friends and watch it together!
